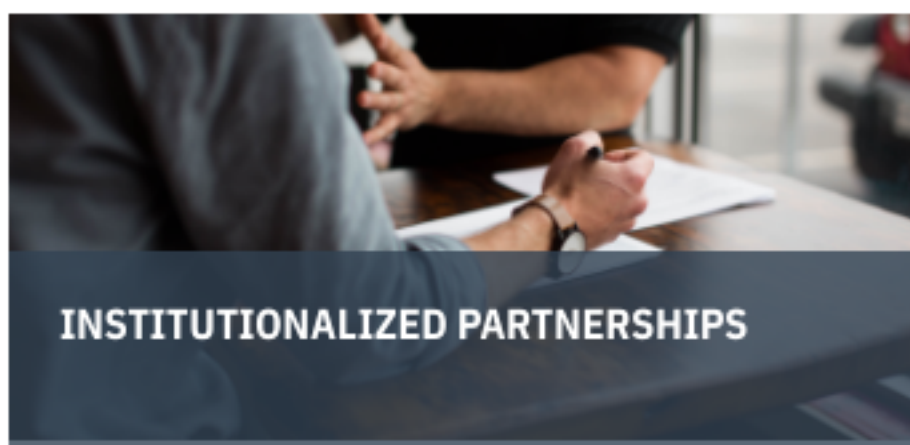
Areas of application :
